FRACKING

Fracking is a general term used to describe the extraction of shale gas from deep underground. It is a highly technical process pumping water and chemicals under high pressure into the ground strata forcing shale gas to the surface for collection and use. It is a controversial process, with many environmentalists concerned about the impact on our underground water systems etc.

The Government has to balance the need to ensure the UK has an adequate energy supply against the many environmental concerns each method brings (e.g. wind farms and wildlife, nuclear power and its inherent risks, carbon fuels and pollution etc.)

Fracking's big question is where is the best location to extract these viable gas deposits? Before exploration commences, an extraction company would need to negotiate a special licence from the Government which gives a limited period in which to explore the presence and viability of shale gas. We have been advised by Staffordshire County Council (SCC) that there are no such "PEDL" licences in our area.

Once a licence has been obtained, planning permission for exploration would be sought through the normal channels. If the results of exploration suggest extraction is viable then further planning permission would need to be sought to carry out a full-scale extraction.

SCC does not have a policy either for or against fracking and would treat each case on its individual merits against normal planning constraints. The Parish Council would also very much welcome your opinions on the subject.

PARISH COUNCIL BUDGET

The Parish Council has now set its budget for 2017/18 which will see a 1.9% increase (equivalent to £1.89 per year or 4p per week) on a Band D property.

The Council has decided that there are a number of important projects to progress next year.

The Council will look to fill two part-time positions to cover, amongst other roles, the maintenance of the JPF and toilets; grass cutting and clearing footpaths and gullies etc. rather than using contractors. The majority of funds for these posts will be found from savings elsewhere. The Council has allocated $\mathfrak{L}20,000$ to renew the footpath along Mill Lane as well as for traffic calming under the bridge. An initial $\mathfrak{L}10,000$ has been earmarked towards a new burial site/garden of remembrance in the parish complementing the funds from Colwich Union of Remembrance and Burial. $\mathfrak{L}5,000$ has been set aside to renew the worn out noticeboards together with a new one at the JPF with a section dedicated to community groups' news and $\mathfrak{L}10,000$ towards a new toilet block at the JPF.

The Council has also started considering more long-term projects including the proposed footpath from the Memorial Hall carpark to the Surgery and a centrally located War Memorial, as detailed in the Chairman's report. Approximately £5,000 has been allocated to each with the intention to allocate additional funds in future years to ensure the monies are available to the Council when the projects are ready to proceed. By forward planning and allocating a small amount each year the Council aims to avoid being forced to raise the full amount in one go, as happened with the previous precept.

NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

Done and dusted! Our plan has finally been formally made with Stafford Borough Council approving it on 22nd November. So what next? Well — there is now an opportunity to develop our own local "Bio-diversity plan". We are all aware of the beautiful countryside in which we live, so the Council is considering developing a detailed plan which will describe how we and fellow parishioners with the backing of land owners, can support this resource and see it enjoyed in a coordinated manner. We will work with organisations such as the Wildlife Trust and Cannock Chase AONB, to develop the plan. This will not be as weighty as our Neighbourhood Plan, nor will it hold the same legal status, but it will provide a good basis detailing what we have and how we can work towards its preservation and enhancement. If you are interested in getting involved, please let the clerk know or contact Cllr Lyall as she is heading up the working party taking this forward.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

When the current Parish Council took office we were keen that we should become as forward looking as possible rather than just reacting to events that come our way. To that end we instigated the annual strategy review to enable councillors to get together informally and consider what needs to be done around the Parish. This review in turn enables us to take a detailed look at Council finances and set budgets and the precept accordingly. Last year you will recall that we realised that years of lowering the precept, whilst spending on major projects, had not left us as financially able as we could have been. This resulted in the higher than normal rise Council Tax.

We have carried out the same process this year, as detailed above. The changes in precept this year are less than 2% - equivalent to between 3p and 8p per week.

As some of you will have noticed, the hedge in Mill Lane has at long last been cut back improving the view through the bridge for road users. This has exposed the old pavement which the Council is now looking at getting repaired to improve safety on that stretch. At the same time, we are in negotiation with Staffordshire County Council to improve safety for pedestrians under the bridge.

In support of road safety around the Parish, we now have our own Community Speed Safety team, (details below), who will be out and about with speed cameras. If anyone is caught exceeding the speed limit, then they will be notified to the Police. Please respect the speed limits around the villages – they are for the benefit of all road users and pedestrians, especially our younger and older residents. If you are interested in getting involved in this project, then please contact Cllr Andy Dunn and training can be provided.

You may also have noted the poor condition of many of our Parish Noticeboards, so therefore we are planning a programme of replacement. These will have a common design and look much smarter than the existing ones.

The Parish remembers its war dead with memorials based in the Memorial Hall and our three churches. This means that we don't have a central single monument like so many other Parishes around us and we end up alternating our remembrance services across the Parish. We believe it would be good to change from this variable routine and so the Council is looking at the feasibility of locating a central memorial (probably in an area set aside in the JPF car park). This idea is very much in the early days so we welcome your general comments on the subject. I believe it



would be good to look to organising special fund raising events and sponsorship if we go ahead.

Staffordshire County Council is working on closing the gap in funding loss from central government which is being withdrawn by 2020. At the moment around 70% of their funds are used on protecting vulnerable people - young and old (a legal requirement), and recent news programmes have also highlighted the pressure that these services are already under. Ultimately, this means that increasing amenity work and other maintenance items are going to be pushed further down the line to Parish level. This has lead us to look seriously at bringing back the traditional "lengthsman" service to ensure our Parish is kept in as good a state of repair as is practicably possibly.

More details of these projects and others will be provided in future Parish Newsletters and on our new website in due course.

I can assure you that the Council will continue to work towards making our neighbourhood a place to be proud of, but in the meantime from councillors and staff, we would all like to wish you a Happy Christmas and prosperous New Year.

COMMUNITY SPEED WATCH

In response to concerns raised about the excessive speed of vehicles through our villages Staffordshire Safer Roads Partnership (SSRP) was approached to provide a presentation to the Council on the introduction of a Community Speed Watch Group (CSWG).

CSW is where Police trained residents monitor speeds of vehicles using a radar device. Throughout Staffordshire and the City of Stoke-on-Trent there are 39 active groups with a further 20 in the pipeline. The objective of the CSW activity is to: reduce the speed of vehicles to the speed limit; increase awareness of the dangers of travelling at an inappropriate speed; reduce the risk of injury to pedestrians and drivers; and to improve the quality of life in our community. When a vehicle is caught speeding, the details are recorded and submitted to the police who send a letter to the registered keeper that their vehicle has been noted to have exceeded the speed limit, the dangers of doing so and the consequences if they are found speeding again. In cases of repeat offences (even from other Groups) further contact from the police can be expected.

The Colwich CSWG has now been set up and six initial sites have been identified in Great Haywood, Little Haywood, and Bishton and the volunteers will soon be able to start the first event. Please contact me if you are interested in becoming a CSW volunteer.

TWINNING VISIT TO RIMBACH

On the 22nd October, 29 lucky Colwich and Haywoods residents were transported to Rimbach, staying in Leuven in Belgium overnight on both legs of the trip.

We all had a terrific stay, the highlights of which were the visit to Strasbourg including the European Parliament and a visit to Heidelburg with its fairy tale castle which dominates the town. Other visits included a wine-tasting and a visit to Carl Benz' town – the park which features a garage housing the first Mercedes Benz prototype and the museum where we were able to see a range of vehicles designed by Carl Benz.

This was not just a holiday – I would say that this was more of a cultural visit, especially because on the Wednesday evening we were treated to an organ recital in a local church. It was also a cultural visit because we stayed with German families – tasting their food, listening to their views and experiencing their way of life.

Everyone was very friendly and it just shows that the value of a self-funding visit like this (everyone paid for him/herself) is that extra dimension — almost seeing the region through German eyes. A REMINDER TO DOG WALKERS

Failure to clear up after your dog can result in prosecution. Bins are placed in strategic locations throughout the parish.

When walking footpaths in more rural locations where there are no nearby bins it remains the responsibility of owners to collect and remove their dog's mess. It is environmentally and socially unacceptable to bag it and leave it piled up in gateways or hanging from branches.

Poo bags, even those purporting to be biodegradable, take many months or years to decompose and can leave a sludge of toxic chemicals which are a danger to wildlife and children. There is simply no point in bagging dog mess only to abandon it; thereby compounding the problem with piles of unsightly and smelly poo bags littering access points to local beauty spots.

If the prospect of clearing up after your dog in areas without immediate access to bins is unduly onerous you may wish to consider restricting yourselves to those areas in which bins are more readily available, thus leaving the countryside for those better able to behave responsibly
