# NEWSLETTER Winter 2017 No. 95 THE DEMOCRATIC PROCESS

#### What is the democratic process?

The Parish Council is the democratic representative body for the parish and, as such, may be able to influence decisions made by outside bodies. But first and foremost, as the first tier of local government, Colwich Parish Council, in common with all other Parish Councils, can help to provide local solutions to local problems, thus building social cohesion – we are all in it together and facing the same challenges! A Parish Council can repair people's disconnection from politics and a feeling of remoteness from decision-making and can contribute to delivering services locally during a time of continued austerity.

Your local council is a democratic, accountable and transparent grassroots body – this is where democracy starts and it provides a structure for taking action: real people power at grassroots level.

Colwich Parish Council meets once a month as the full council and regularly as topic Committees (e.g. Finance, Environment & Leisure) and has many powers to act and spend money for the benefit of the parish. We discuss anything that affects all or part of the community as, no doubt, you will read in the rest of this Newsletter.

#### How is a Councillor elected?

The usual avenue to become a Councillor is through election at the Ordinary election, on the first Thursday in May every four years, coinciding with the elections for Stafford Borough Council. The next Colwich Parish Council Ordinary election will be 2nd May 2019. To stand for election you must meet certain criteria and be nominated and seconded by two eligible electors from the relevant Ward (Great Haywood HHA or Little Haywood/Colwich HHB). The chairman and vice-chairman positions are elected annually by the members of the Council.

Alternatively, if a Councillor resigns mid-term there would be what is known as a "casual vacancy" Local Government



Act 1972 s. 84-90 refer. Initially a Notice of Vacancy is posted to allow eligible electors to call for a poll provided that there was a period of at least six months left until the next Ordinary Election of the Parish Council. An election will be triggered if 10 electors, from the Ward, write, requesting one, to the **Returning Officer at Stafford Borough Council** within 14 working days of the publication of the Notice, the Representation of the People Act 1983 s. 36 refers. If no poll is requested the Parish Council will then take steps to advertise the vacancy so as to co-opt someone under the Local Elections (Parishes and Communities) (England and Wales) Rules 2006. Details of recent co-opted members can be seen on the front page of this Newsletter.

## What do candidates have to do in order to meet the required criteria?

To become a Parish Councillor, you must work or own/rent land in the parish or live in or within 3 miles of the parish, be a member of the European Union or a qualifying Commonwealth citizen, be 18 or over and be eligible to vote. It is important that sufficient candidates come forward to hold a poll and that electors then exercise their rights to vote. If fewer candidates come forward than there are seats then they will be elected unopposed and you will lose your ability to decide the members of the Council. Remember, Parish Councillors are the people who are the closest to you and will be able to represent your interests.

#### What do Councillors do?

Parish Councillors represent the people living in their area and they help to keep it a great place to live and work. Your Parish Councillor is your closest link to any form of government. When decisions are being made, they are there to put your views across.

If you are passionate about something that will benefit the local community then why don't you become a Councillor and have your say? If you don't want to do that, then perhaps there is someone in your community that could do that for you.

### How can I, as a Councillor, promote the work of Colwich Parish Council?

To promote the work of your Council is easy because Colwich Parish Council remains a strong and constant force, delivering for local people and making a difference in our community against a background of national politics which appears to be in a fluid and uncertain state. Local government has its problems and crises too but here in Colwich, we seem to have survived because, and following on from the success of our Neighbourhood Plan, Colwich Parish Council continues to invest in the economic, environmental and social prosperity of our area. I say "economic" because we try to encourage local business to thrive, liaising with planners and developers to increase our local infrastructure making it easier, for example, to work from home. I say "environmental" because we are actively protecting and enhancing the rich diversity around and within, Colwich Parish. I say "social" because we try to identify social need and bring people together to help each other this is probably going to be a large part of the Council's work during 2018/2019.

# **RIMBACH TWINNING VISI**

The Partnerschaftsverein, Rimbach, Germany visited the Haywoods from 12th to 17th October, 2017. The Party of thirty-three included ten teenagers and two members of the Rimbach Lions Club.

On the 13th October they visited the Marston Salt Works where they had a Guided tour of the former Salt Works, now a museum depicting the process of recovering the salt from the underground deposits that prevail in the Cheshire Plain.

On the Saturday the adults spent the day in Chester. The younger member of the group, meanwhile, were joined by counterparts from the parish for a trip to Birmingham where they visited the Birmingham City Library and Art Galleries. Following some free time in the afternoon they returned to Stafford where they joined up with members of the 1st Colwich Senior Guides and members of the Colwich Youth Council for an evening meal at Pizza Hut.

The Sunday saw the juniors from both Rimbach and the Haywoods meet at Milford Common for a hike across Cannock Chase incorporating a "military style" challenge led by the Colwich Senior Guides together with a picnic lunch. They were met by cars at Milford to be taken to Stone for a session at "Flip Out" before returning to their host families. A more leisurely time was enjoyed by the adults who were entertained by their hosts with visits to local places of interest such as Shugborough and Trentham and even a trip along the Trent and Mersey in a narrow boat.

On Monday there was a coach trip to Cosford to the Royal Air Force Museum during the day. The evening included a farewell dinner at the Great Haywood Memorial Hall for 84 people. After dinner there were speeches by Cllr. Andy Cooper, Chairman of Colwich Parish Council, and Rolf Lempp, Deputy Burgermeister of Rimbach, Annette Bloor, Colwich Twinning Association, and Markus Altendorf, Chairman of the Partnerschaftverein, Rimbach.

The original members of the twinning movements are now well into retirement and indeed some have sadly passed away. The future of twinning in both communities is, therefore, with the younger members. Many of the Rimbach youngsters were hosted by the families of the Haywoods youngsters, and this has sparked an interest in the intermediate generation. The Colwich & Haywoods Association and youngsters are all invited back to Rimbach next year and there is now a real feeling that the future of twinning between our two communities is now seen as more positive than in recent years.







An initial meeting between the Parish Council and the Association was held on 30th November to begin the process of developing a plan for the future of the Association and how we can work together to ensure its survival and growth.

Membership of the Association is open to all who share the Twinning ethos. All members pay their own way for visits. Fund raising events are held throughout the year to raise monies, for instance, to cover the cost of the days detailed above. The Council will consider the entries, at its Annual Meeting, for both categories and decide a winner - to be announced at the Annual Parishioners meeting in May 2018. *The small print – Councillors, officials and their immediate families will be excluded from entering!*  It is that time of year again when the Parish Council reviews the costs involved in its operation and projects – new and ongoing. As we are in the middle of the process, I can't confirm details of future proposals or cost assessments at this stage – as they haven't been discussed and agreed in Full Council, but we have reviewed existing work and can feedback some of our considerations as follows:

- Investigations to link the Great Haywood Memorial Hall with a footpath to the surgery carpark are ongoing.
- The Council is continuing in cooperation with CURB to look at resolving the shortage of burial ground options in the Parish. A subject expert presented to the Council in December.
- We are working with Staffordshire County Council and Cllr John Francis to look at making Mill Lane safer for pedestrians. We hope to have some positive news in the near future.
- The Council is considering new ways to engage with the community. We are considering taking a stall at forthcoming craft fayres in Great Haywood Memorial Hall. If this proves successful, we will roll out the idea out to similar opportunities around the Parish. If you see us at one of these events, please come and have a chat – we are always keen to meet residents and get feedback.
- Our local Speedwatch volunteer team is continuing to operate in the Parish at various times and locations with success. The team needs more volunteers – if you are interested in helping out on this please let us know and you will of course receive appropriate training.

Undoubtedly one of the Council's best initiatives is the appointment of lengthsmen, for which we have received a lot of positive feedback. We are all benefiting from their ongoing work around our parish. Some of their recent activities that you may or may not be aware of include:

- Managing the hedges at Abbeyfields and Oldfields Crescent.
- Maintaining the Jubilee Playing Field.
- Assisting with the planting of thousands of bulbs for the River of Flowers project.

- Weeding areas around the parish that haven't been treated for many years e.g. footbridge behind Colwich School, Coley Lane, Meadow Lane and Mill Lane (opposite Canalside).
- Attended and passed a course for the safe handling and use of pesticides.

I have been working closely with the Twinning Association which has been buoyed up by the recent very successful visit by our counterparts from Germany (see full report on the next page). I am delighted that several new members have joined or are considering joining the Association, and there is now a very strong youth link between the two associations. I would encourage anyone who is interested or just simply wanting to know more about the Association chair Annette Bloor (Tel: 881749). The Parish Council is also setting up a page with links on its own website for the Association.

One interesting comment that has surfaced on Face-Book recently is the suggestion for Christmas lights in our Parish – something already done in other surrounding villages including our neighbours Hixon. I'd be interested to hear your thoughts. We have to bear in mind we are one Parish but several villages – would a shared central location like the JPF frontage be a good idea?

One idea that the Council is looking to develop is that of "One Community" and a lot of our efforts are already in this direction. We are aware that although one Civic Parish, we comprise several villages – but we should still see ourselves as one community. An example of that is the idea of the **River of Flowers** that will run from the A51 at Great Haywood, through Little Haywood and back to the A51 at Colwich connecting us all in an environmentally friendly way. Do you have any others you would like us to consider?

As ever, I can assure you that the Parish Council will continue to work towards making our neighbourhood a place to be proud of, but in the meantime from councillors and staff, we would all like to wish you all a Happy Christmas and prosperous New Year.
