christmas lights 2020

s the weeks go by and Christmas gets nearer it is becoming very apparent that Christmas 2020 is going to be very different than we would want it to be. Public celebrations will be far less than usual and those that do take place will be very much scaled down. Some people will be faced with not spending Christmas with families and friends which is a very dismal thought. For this reason, the Parish Council wishes to encourage everyone to reach out to each other and light up your homes to bring light into a dark world. Our villagers rose to the occasion on VE Day to mark the event and with the Scarecrow competition. Whilst the time of year is not conducive to sitting outside, as we did in May, we can still bring cheer to others by decorating our homes with light.

The Parish Council lights within our villages will consist of Christmas trees in Colwich by the school, at the Parish office in Little Haywood and in Trent Square, Great Haywood. There will be further lights at the Jubilee Playing Field. In addition to these the more lights that each household, church and pub can display the better. We would, of course, encourage everyone to consider the environment and make use of energy saving lights such as LED lights which are readily available and can be run at very little cost to your pockets and the environment. Moreover, we would ask that lights be switched off by 11:00pm, if possible.

In line with many other areas there will be no grand switch-on event this year but on Saturday 28th November at 7 pm the lights will go on. Stand by your mobile phones, electronic communication devices etc from 6.55pm on that evening to view the digital switch on. More details will be provided on Facebook and the Parish website in the week leading up to the switch-on. We are aware that not all villagers are on Facebook and so we would ask those who are to keep their neighbours up to date.

We are led to believe that Santa will be making a visit to our villages during the days before Christmas. As he knows what is best for girls and boys, and wants to keep everyone safe, he will not be stopping to talk but he will have a cheery wave for everyone. Here again, keep your eye on Facebook and spread the word around.

As last year, the Parish Council will be running the best Christmas decorated house competition and an application form is attached with this Newsletter. We shall be offering prizes for the best lit-up house and the best lit street. The competition will be judged on similar lines to the Scarecrow competition and we invite all villagers to vote for their favourites. Hopefully some householders will wish to have their decorations up in time for switch-on day on the 28th November but we know that other people will prefer to wait until a little nearer Christmas itself. We would encourage everyone to have their lights up by the date indicated on the application form when votes will start to be accepted so that by the time Christmas arrives our villages will be ready to welcome a somewhat different Christmas.

Light spreads joy, cheer and hope for a better 2021. Let's go for it and wish our friends, neighbours and villagers a very Happy Christmas.

SCARECROW COMPETITION

Participating households, for street entries, should be indicated in the space below. All entry monies will be donated to the Council's charity of the year. In 2020 this will be "Little Laura". Judging, by residents, will be on the weekends of 12th/13th December and/or 19th/20th December 2020. Winners will be announced during the Council's virtual meeting to be held on 13th January 2021. All illuminations should be turned off by 11:00pm. The winning trophies in the two categories will be made out to the name as on the entry form. uring the lockdown period in the spring, a group of local people, coordinated by Anne-Marie and Colin Rattray, came together to offer assistance to the those who were shielding or isolating. The group collected shopping and prescriptions as well as offering a friendly ear. The Parish Council offered to cover the travel costs of these volunteers. Instead they asked that an equivalent amount be donated, in their name, to Rugeley Food Bank. In total the Council donated £295.85.

COLWICH PARISH IN BLOOM

The origins of our group date back to 1992, when the Parish Council requested a small group of residents to form a committee to work for entry in the 1993 Community Council of Staffordshire's Best Kept Village (BKV) Competition. We continued to enter this competition until 2016, actually winning it in 1996 the same year we first entered the Heart of England in Bloom. We won Gold Awards from Heart of England in Bloom in 2015, 2017, 2018 and 2019.

As we are a very small group, we decided, in 2018, that entering the BKV competition



was simply too much work for us and to concentrate, in future, on the In Bloom competition, hence the change of name.

2020 has been a year of mixed fortunes for us. Earlier in the year, our good friend and colleague Amyas Stafford Northcote passed away. Amyas had been our Chair since 1997 and is sadly missed. In July we held a remembrance ceremony to commemorate his service to our group, planting a flowering cherry tree in Trent Square, Great Haywood as a permanent memorial to him.

We are grateful to the Parish Council who have sponsored most of our horticultural requirements from Roseacre Nurseries. In return we hope to help the Council to continue with their River of Flowers initiative starting with the planting of 2000 daffodil bulbs at both A51 entrances to the villages.

To support the Keep Britain Tidy's Great British September Clean promotion, we joined forces with the Plastic Free Colwich and Haywoods group to hold a grand litter

Floods and Drains

cause concerns. Flooding is nothing new in the Haywoods and there are many photographs showing some spectacular ones over the years.

Surface water, naturally, drains from the hills into the village centres of both Great and Little Haywood. An increase over the years in paved roads, drives and parking areas and a drainage system that has its origins many years ago, and some of the reasons for the flooding become more obvious. Added to this is the frequency of the deluges in recent years which have become a regular occurrence with sudden and heavy downpours taking place several times a year and the drainage system is unable to cope. Whatever the reasons, the question remains: 'what is to be done about it?'.

Regular flooding of people's homes is not acceptable. The responsibility for the provision and maintenance of an efficient surface drainage system lies firmly with

Floods have featured large in our the County Council. Furthermore, road villages this year and continue to sweeping, not least to clear fallen leaves, lies with the Borough Council However, both the County Borough Councils are short of money and looking at ways to economize. Services have been prioritised, with some cut down to a minimum, as their ability to raise Council Tax is capped at 3% per year. The Parish Council were informed in 2019 that the County Council would be reducing the frequency that drains are cleared and gullies emptied meaning our gullies will be cleansed once every 2-3 years.

> Whilst emphasizing that the maintenance of these gullies and drains remains the responsibility of the County Council, there are options available to the Parish Council to allocate some of our budget to make up for the shortfall in services. The Parish Council, for instance, commissioned Burntwood Group, at a cost of £4,800 +VAT, to clear all the gullies within the Parish. This work began in mid-March and was completed in May, after the first Lockdown. Other nearby Parish Councils have been unable to find these resources

and so remain solely on the Highways schedule.

Recently, the Council's Lengthsmen have emptied a number of gullies on Back Lane, Little Haywood, by hand, as approaches to County Highways resulted in no action. Previously, they have hand cleared other gullies, for instance on Meadow Lane which fill up with silt washing down Coley Lane. Obviously, their abilities are limited by the equipment and time that they have available to them and, without significant investment, would not be in a position to empty all the gullies in the Parish.

The ever-increasing financial restraints on the Borough and County Councils raise a significant issue for the Parish Council and the opinion of the villagers would be appreciated. Statutory responsibility remains with the County and/or the Borough Council. However, the Parish may undertake certain tasks, e.g. clearing leaves, emptying gullies and grids, to make up for the shortfall in services. Are you happy for the precept, the Parish Council's element of the Council Tax charge, to be spent in this way? If yes, what tasks would you like us to take on?

MILL LANE

Over recent years the Parish Council has been allocating funds, within its budget, to help finance traffic improvements along Mill Lane, Great Haywood. We have held numerous discussions with County Highways officials facilitated by Councillor John Francis, our local County Councillor, to agree the best solution to this issue.

Mill Lane is a very busy through road for traffic travelling between Stafford into and through the village, not least onward travel to the industrial estates at Hixon. Mill Lane, naturally, was one of the sites chosen by the Community Speed Watch group as studies showed that vehicles were consistently and persistently exceeding the speed limit. Coupled with the number and speed of vehicles is the lack of safe pedestrian access up to and under the railway bridge. The Council considered a pedestrian tunnel through the railway embankment but this was not supported by Network Rail.

County Highways' proposal, received over the summer, is to reinstate a footpath leading up to the bridge, a protected pathway under the bridge and a short section of new pathway joining up with the pavement opposite Canalside. This pathway will be supported by
