
NEWSLETTE SCARECROW COMPETITION

INGESTRE ORANGERY

Today, The Orangery is a beautiful venue, situated near St. Mary's Church at Ingestre, complimenting

the historic church designed by Sir Christopher Wren in 1673. Couples often marry in the church and have their wedding party at The Orangery, enjoying the spacious, light, elegant venue and the stunning gardens.

This venue though may have easily been forgotten if Friends of the Ingestre Orangery (FOIO), a charity formed in 2012 did not start an initiative for its'



restoration. They were supported by the National Heritage Lottery Fund, the European Agricultural Fund for Rural Development, the Historic Houses foundation and other organisations and finally in 2019, The Orangery was transformed into a building for community use, a venue for weddings, art exhibitions, concerts and other functions. During this period volunteers were crucial in the process of transforming it.

Before the restoration started there was a fig tree going through the

roof and a fox lived in The Orangery which had been closed off for the public due to safety reasons. It was volunteers who cleared the building and the gardens and



it is volunteers who still today plant flowers, cut the grass and maintain the gardens. Volunteers are currently working on transforming the Apple store building into a space for volunteers and a café that will host a variety of activities.

MOTHERS' UNION

During the past year the Mothers' Union have set up a "Rise Up Campaign" against abuse and gender-

Although we collected the award really it is for everyone, Anson School, Great Haywood, Colwich and Little Haywood. Without this support we would not have achieved this award.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Summer has been and gone, and the long nights are drawing in. However, before we look ahead, congratulations to the winning entry for the annual scarecrow competition; the designs are always charming and the community spirit around this event continues to be incredibly wholesome. The scarecrow connoisseurs amongst us will have noticed that the Parish Council chose to hold this year's competition in July rather than September, this was done to complement the judging season for the Royal Horticultural Society "Britain in Bloom" campaign. Also, it was determined that a presummer holiday competition would avoid adding to the pressures felt in September – when the new school term kicks into full swing. For these reasons, we intend on keeping the competition in July.

Parish activities will resume in October, when the first parish-wide Halloween decoration competition will be held from Saturday 26th October until Sunday 3rd November. Please note – the Parish Council discourages the use of fake spider webs on the outside of their homes, as these have been shown to be hazardous to the local wildlife. Nevertheless, we look forward to seeing how the villages embrace the spirit of the season.

Further ahead, we look forward to hosting our annual Christmas lights switch-on event on Saturday 30th November at the Jubilee Playing Field (JPF), an afternoon/evening of food, fun and festivities that is everchanging. For those who have recently moved into the parish, this event serves as the parish's annual finale. As always, further information on upcoming events can be found in this newsletter.

On the topic of information, the Parish Council utilises seasonal newsletters, noticeboards, social media websites and has a dedicated website of its own. The Communications Committee oversees improvements to these methods of communication. To date, the Council's website has seen some restructuring, and the Parish Council Facebook page has increased its activity. One change that is coming to the newsletters is the addition of a rolling "Parish History" article – whereby residents are invited to submit photos and/or historical information on the area; we feel this will help educate younger generations on how the parish has evolved. This initiative was inspired by the recent works of local historian Mr David Robbie – author of Great Haywood: Past & Present, People and Places.

We appreciate that there are residents who do not use social media websites such as Facebook and X (formerly Twitter). With that in mind, we would be interested in hearing how we can improve our methods of communication further.

COMMUNITY FIRST RESPONDERS



These marvellous people are volunteers who have been selected and trained by

West Midlands Ambulance Service, to provide a rapid response to 999 calls passed to them by WMAS. The idea is that they operate in a radius of approximately 5 miles and can get to a possible life-threatening situation in the vital first few minutes of an incident, before the paramedics arrive

The scheme has been initiated by Hixon Memorial Hall, with the plan that when the Community First Responders (CFRs) are financially self-sufficient they will become a standalone charity. When the scheme goes live during the summer, we will start with two qualified CFRs with two more waiting training.

The area which will benefit from the scheme stretches from Colwich, through the Haywoods, Hixon, Weston and Salt, to Sandon and all the rural communities in between.

We were very fortunate that as we were starting to put the project together in December 2023, Keele CFRs were in the process of buying a new emergency vehicle and needed to sell the old one, so the Memorial Hall stepped in and organised the purchase!

The financial forecast for the setting up in the first year, which included buying the car, insurance, uniforms and equipment, was £11,000. We started fundraising in February, with some events in Hixon Memorial Hall. With generous donations from local businesses, private individuals and the additional support of some of the village halls in the area, we are approximately three quarters of the way to our target, which is an excellent achievement in such a short time.

The whole basis of the scheme is that it really is a genuine community project, manned, run and financed by the community that it serves, so a massive thank you to all those kind people who have supported us so far.

At 7.30pm on Friday 6th December, we have our Christmas feel-good film - Harvey.


