Our youngest Parish Councillor and a young woman who is going places!

What a year Victoria Jenkinson is having! Victoria was elected to Colwich Parish Council for the Great Haywood ward at the May 2015 election.

In September, Victoria was in Parliament in her capacity as a Girlguiding Advocate. There are only twenty such Advocates in the U.K. who bring into prominence discussion about disability, race, discrimination and other issues of importance. All Advocates receive training in how to deal effectively with the media and are sent all over the U.K. to speak at conferences, talk to decision makers, create campaigns and represent girls and young women as part of Girlquiding. When I interviewed Councillor Jenkinson, she was keen to stress that the Advocate selection procedure was very rigorous. She found out about Girlguiding Advocates through Girlguiding in Colwich Parish. What girls want is at the forefront of what Victoria does, as well as looking after the concerns of young people in general. Also during September Cllr Jenkinson spoke at the pre-screening of the film "Suffragette" at the Twentieth Century Fox Studios in London.

In addition Victoria has been to dinner with our M.P. Jeremy Lefroy, in the Houses of Parliament. At this event she met other M.P.'s. I am sure that she found this fruitful as she is very interested in the way that people in positions of power (i.e. decision-makers) communicate with minority groups. Cllr Jenkinson was provided with the opportunity to express her disappointment to see that there was not a single male M.P. who attended the recent Action Aid conference which discussed issues affecting women and girls globally.

In terms of the Parish Council, Victoria has had a significant impact! We are now thinking in different ways. As a current serving Councillor and as someone who has served on the previous Council, I can say that we were having difficulties in being in touch with



the youth of our community. Cllr Jenkinson has given us a legitimate base from which to have a dialogue with local young people and was a driving force behind the formation of our new Youth Committee.

Cllr Jenkinson is obviously pleased with the way things have gone and she has other things in the pipe-line including further speaking events, a meeting with German M.P. Silvana Koch-Mehrin and a visit to many European cities with 1st Colwich Senior Section.

By participating in such events Victoria is making an impact as a young person with a passion for change and she is in an excellent position to go out and make a huge difference in the future! Victoria has also recently achieved her Gold Duke of Edinburgh's Award presented at St. James' Palace and illustrated a new book for children. I believe Victoria to be an inspirational figure. She is incredibly hard-working and she loves getting involved.

WAR MEMORIAL

The WW1 Committee is investigating the possibility of establishing a single memorial that would commemorate those who have lost their lives as a result of conflicts from the whole of Colwich Parish. The plan was proposed at the Exhibition in August 2014. At present, there are four memorials, the Memorial Hall itself, which has two plaques, one in St Stephen's Church, one in St John's Church and one at Colwich lych gate. Only the last one is accessible at all hours to the public. Furthermore, research has found that not every fallen person connected with the Parish has been commemorated. The possible site could be in the Jubilee Playing Field area. Comments from residents as to siting and design would be welcomed. A single memorial would mean that the whole community could gather at one place on Remembrance Day.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT - WINTER 2015

On September 24th, I had great pleasure in meeting Borough Councillor Frances Beatty at Stafford Borough Council's offices to formally handover Colwich's Neighbourhood Plan for final SBC consultation. By the time this Newsletter reaches you, we should have had the conclusions from that stage and be preparing to forward our Plan to the Government Inspector. At each stage, it is carrying more weight when it comes to planning decisions at the Borough and of course for any proposed plans that are subsequently taken on to appeal. Indeed, it has already been cited as the "Emerging Neighbourhood Plan" as part of the objections used by the SBC Planning Dept. against unwanted developments. One such rejected proposal was the re-submission of the development of the land around Shenley Cottage. The developer/owner now has the option to appeal again and we will have to wait and see whether this happens and then what the result would be. Either way, I'm pleased to say that it is quite clear our emerging Plan has been used to great effect in recent decisions.



As Chairman of the Parish Council, I'm occasionally invited to a variety of events to represent our Council and residents. As we head deeper into the Christmas season, Remembrance Sunday seems a long time ago and after attending the service and parade in Stafford during the morning, I joined our own afternoon Parish Service, which this year was held in St Stephen's, Great Haywood. A good number of my fellow Councillors, and our MP Jeremy Lefroy and his wife joined with residents to help fill the church to capacity. This year was special, as research carried out mainly by Dave Robbie enabled several new names of local men lost

in the conflicts to be read out for the first time along with all the others previously known. Dave has also prepared a number of new Memorial Books listing not only the names of all the men, but also details about their life histories, thereby adding depth to the reality that these were real people with lives just as full as our own. The three local Churches will each retain a copy of the book as will the Parish Council and Memorial Hall. I'm sure that I echo all our sentiments in passing our heartfelt thanks to Dave for this outstanding and lasting contribution to the historical record of our communities.

The Council has, once again, been able to assist many of our Community Groups through its small grants programme. Over \mathfrak{L}^2 ,000 has been distributed this year and we will be looking to provide even greater support in 2016.

On a more serious note, I'm sad to report a recent incident on the JPF where a fire was started using scrap out of the recycling bins. Although no substantial damage was caused, there was a lot of mess leaving others to clear it up. The Council has decided to invest in extending the CCTV equipment already in place to include additional coverage and strategically placed night vision. Perpetrators who are intent on spoiling this facility and the enjoyment of others will be identified, the police informed and action taken. Sadly, we have also had reports from the BKV team that there have been attempted thefts of the 'flower towers' which have been used to enhance the appearance of our villages and aid us in the competitions. If you see any such unlawful activity, please contact the police as soon as possible.

I'd also like to take the opportunity in this Newsletter to clarify the meaning of "public participation time" which appears on the agenda of our Council meetings. Please bear in mind that these are

Parish Council Meetings and not Public Meetings are used which and managed in guite a different way. As Councillors, we were elected by you to make certain decisions on behalf of the Parish, and we cannot be seen to have our thinking unduly influenced by (say) one or two more persuasive members of the public. There is also a legal requirement to publish an agenda a number of days



before a meeting in order to allow Councillors to consider the issues in good time - and of course enable the public to see what is coming up. (This is the reason why there can never be an AOB. section!) As we also have a tight time schedule to try and cover the Council's business, this Council chooses to restrict the Public Question time to enable members of the public to ask questions or raise points in an orderly manner that relate to the published agenda for that meeting. If a none-agenda issue is raised, it simply cannot be considered as it has not been published in advance! Consequently, if you have an issue that you believe should be brought before the Council, please contact the Clerk or your local Parish Councillor who will look to have it added to an appropriate meeting. Understandably some may see this procedure as too restrictive, so to counter any perceived negativity, and subject to approval by the Council, we are looking to hold "Council Surgeries" - probably starting in the New Year, where people can drop in to an arranged location in the Parish to informally discuss issues of concern or otherwise. Further information on these surgeries will be published as soon as any plans are made.

Finally, it only remains for me on behalf of the Clerks and all of us on the Parish Council to wish you all a joyful Christmas time and a prosperous and healthy New Year.

HAYWOODS FLOWER AND VEGETABLE SHOW


